

## **Bibliometric Analysis of Articles on “Covid-19/ Pandemic” with Research Trends in Economics Literature**

### **Abstract**

COVID-19 (2019 coronavirus disease), which is a global epidemic, has been threatening the whole world, especially human health since 2019. Although it is a crisis emerging in the field of health, it is observed that its impact is felt both globally and sectoral and it has greater negative effects than the 1929 Economic Depression and the Second World War. Both the negative effects of the pandemic and the restrictions taken in order to reduce the rate of spread cause an increase in the reflections of health, economy, social and psychological dynamics. In this respect, it is necessary to deal with multidimensional studies investigating the effects of the pandemic in a holistic framework in the academic literature. In this context, the aim of this research is to analyse the "Pandemi-Covid-19" themed studies in journals published by the Faculty of Economics and Administrative Sciences in the DergiPark database with bibliometric analysis method. For this purpose, bibliometric analysis technique, one of the qualitative research methods, was used in the study. Bibliometric studies are used to reflect the transformation of a concept in the process. Studies of this type provide the opportunity to compare different studies. Peer-reviewed publications of 49 journals between the years 2020-2022 are scanned, and only the numbers of journals that are available and accessible in the relevant database are considered. Since the journals published by the faculties of economics and administrative sciences are scanned, the extent of the academic reflections of the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic on the economy and related fields will be revealed as a result of the analysis.
